

#### **AVID**

As we inch closer to the end of the school year, it is the perfect time to shed light on the similarities and differences in the implementation of AVID at SVUE and NRMS. We will begin with the latter. The primary difference is the determination of AVID students. At North Ridge, students who qualify and are accepted into the AVID program will have an elective class designed to give them the supports needed to reach their potential. How does a student qualify for AVID? Truthfully, the process had been yearlong based on attendance, academic progress, and behavior. The process begins with data analysis by staff at both NRMS and SVUE. Based upon this data, classroom teachers then provide input on daily effort, attendance, work completion, and behavior. From that point, recommendations are made and letters to apply are sent home. If your child receives a letter of application, please make sure this is returned promptly – many students miss out on the chance to be in the AVID program at NRMS because they fail this initial measure of student responsibility – a major component of being a true AVID student. During this elective class, students will have tutors meet with them twice a week, have weekly binder checks, work on college and career based activities, gain exposure to multiple study methods, learn to evaluate how their time is spent, and delve into other goal-oriented activities. Being part of the AVID program also brings a family feel and a wrap around that sometimes seems lacking in a departmentalized setting such as NRMS and DHS. We will spend time in the next article explaining the similarities. Good luck to those that apply!

## Fifth Grade

Fifth grade teachers are working hard to prepare students for 6th grade.

Math - Students are wrapping up adding and subtracting fractions and will begin multiplying and dividing fractions soon.

ELA- Students are reading Non-Fiction texts about the Industrial Revolution and what value technology brings to people's lives.

Science - Students are looking at the ecosystems and will begin discussing biomes next.





#### Google Log-In info

To access Google Classroom, once the student has logged into his/her Chromebook, you will visit www.google.com. In the upper right-hand corner, the student will need to login (if they are not already). To do this, they will login using the same credentials used to logged into their Chromebook. This will be the last four letters of their last name. first two letters of their first name, and the last two numbers of their birth year. For example: (John Smith 2007 = smitjo07). Please make sure your child has the appropriate classroom code that is specific to your child's teacher. They will need this code to access online materials as needed.
