<u>Kindergarten</u>

We are coming to the end of our 3rd quarter in Kindergarten! Your child should have the following skills mastered at this time: identifying letters and their sounds, identifying numbers from 0-20, and counting to 100 by 10's & 1's. Please continue to work on these skills at home daily if your child has not yet mastered them. You child's teacher will be contacting you for Parent-Teacher conferences this month to discuss your child's 3rd quarter report card. Remember your child has homework daily for class. We appreciate your support!

FIRST GRADE

Happy March! We are now into 3rd quarter and still have many skills to hit in our short time with students. The three main things we are hitting hard are sight words, reading fluency and adding/subtracting. Please practice these as much as possible at home. If you need new flash cards or ideas, please contact your student's teacher. We are looking forward to sharing progress at conferences later this month!

Second Grade

Hello families! We can't believe it is March already! We are continuing to work hard and appreciate all the help you are giving at home to make sure your child is as successful as possible. We are moving right along in our Reading. We are continuing with Unit 7: Tales to Live By. Our next unit will be Investigating the Past. We should begin that mid-March. In math, we are continuing to practice adding and subtracting two-digit numbers with regrouping. Please practice this skill with your child. We are also going to begin money and time. March 22 is an asynchronous day and will also be parent teacher conferences. They will be done the same as in the fall, so be on the lookout for more information as the time gets closer. <u>Third Grade</u>

Calling all parents! Please encourage your student to continue turning in all assignments. Practice is very important to retain the skills being taught each day. Each 3rd grade student should be reading aloud every day for 15 minutes to increase their fluency and comprehension. They should also be practicing multiplication facts using Reflex or flashcards. Knowing their facts will make a huge impact on their overall Math grade. The in-person 3rd graders will be meeting with the Ag Lady again in March. She will be sharing a lesson about sheep! We are looking forward to that! Keep working hard 3rd grade!

Fourth Grade

Hello 4th grade families! We are gearing up for Spring Break but have a lot of work to do before that! Please make sure your student is doing their homework, practicing flash cards, and reading with you at home! The extra practice at home this year is incredibly helpful. Hope you are staying healthy and enjoying the warmer weather!

ACCESS TESTING:

The ACCESS for English Language Learners grades K-12 will be administered in person March 15-26, 2021. Illinois schools are currently operating under Restore Illinois Phase 4, which allows in-person instruction while following public health requirements. Schools will be preparing assessment plans that will follow state guidelines to keep all students and staff safe. Schools must follow the Illinois Department of Public Health requirements when administering spring 2021 assessments. Those requirements during Restore Illinois Phase 4 are:

Require use of appropriate personal protective equipment, including face coverings; Prohibit more than 50 individual from gathering in one space; Require social distancing be observed, as much as possible; Require that schools conduct symptom screenings and temperature checks or require that individuals self-certify that they are free of symptoms before entering school buildings; and Require an increase in schoolwide cleaning and disinfection.

You will be receiving additional information from your student's ESL teacher or school. Students will bring their current school device to use during testing. El ACCESS para estudiantes de inglés de los grados K-12 se administrará en persona del 15 al 26 de marzo de 2021. Las escuelas de Illinois actualmente operan bajo la Fase 4 de Restaurar Illinois, que permite la instrucción en persona mientras se cumplen los requisitos de salud pública.

Las escuelas prepararán planes de evaluación que seguirán las pautas estatales para mantener seguros a todos los estudiantes y al personal. Las escuelas deben cumplir con los requisitos del Departamento de Salud Pública de Illinois al administrar las evaluaciones de primavera de 2021. Esos requisitos durante la Fase 4 de Restaurar Illinois son:

Exigir el uso de equipo de protección personal adecuado, incluidas las cubiertas faciales Prohibir que más de 50 personas se reúnan en un espacio; Exigir que se observe el distanciamiento social, en la medida de lo posible; Exigir que las escuelas realicen exámenes de detección de síntomas y controles de temperatura o exigir que las personas certifiquen por sí mismas que no tienen síntomas antes de ingresar a los edificios escolares; y Requerir un aumento en la limpieza y desinfección de toda la escuela.

Usted recibirá información adicional del maestro de ESL o de la escuela.

Los estudiantes traerán su propio aparato electronico escolar para usar durante la prueba. Se ofrecerá transporte en autobús para aquellos estudiantes que estan remoto que lo necesiten. Kindergarten Registration

The following will need to be in your student's file before they can start Kindergarten in the fall:

Current Physical (dated 8/19/2020 or after)-this must include blood lead screening and diabetes risk assessment

Current, up to date immunization record

Eye Examination by an Optometrist or Waiver (Due by 10/15/2021)

Dental Exam (Due by 5/15/2022)

The sooner you get these completed and turned into the nurse's office, the better. Doctors offices get very busy over the summer with school physicals and immunizations, which can make it difficult to get an appointment. Getting everything completed as soon as possible will make your Kindergarten registration process in June go more quickly. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact the school nurse.

AVID Strategy of the Month
