The preschool classrooms are starting to learn the routines and understand what it means to be part of a classroom. As the season is changing, many of the classrooms have decided to observe and learn about trees and how they are affected by the seasons. Other classrooms have decided to follow different children interests such as pizza, balls, and cookies. The classrooms will spend several weeks learning about a particular study while embedding basic academic skills such as learning letters, counting objects, and writing into the topic of study. In addition, much of the learning takes place while the child is playing or exploring materials, so they are engaged and interested in the learning activities that are presented to them. We enroll children as young as 3 years old into the preschool program and still have a few openings. Even if you think your child may not be ready, it may be helpful to get them screened to see what activities you can be working on at home as well as get them on the waiting list for a future spot in our program. ## SECOND GRADE

IN MATH WE ARE CONTINUING TO WORK ON FACT FLUENCY. WE WILL BE WORKING ON ADDING WITHIN 100 USING STRATEGIES. THIS COULD BE A NEW CONCEPT FOR SOME SO PLEASE PRACTICE AT HOME AS WELL FOR EXTRA SUPPORT. ALSO, PRACTICE MATH FLASH CARDS FOR FACT FLUENCY.

## Third Grade

It's already November! In Math, we will continue learning strategies for multiplication and division. Please help your students practice their math facts at home. # Fourth Grade

Hello families! Please be checking your student's agendas and backpacks for information on parent teacher conferences. Conferences will be held on November 9th and 10th (those will be early dismissal days too!). We look forward to seeing you there! In reading we are finishing up Unit 2 which is all about how we reveal ourselves to others and characters actions and reactions in fictional stories. After that we will start reading about characters different points of view. In math we are working on multiplication (a 2- or 3-digit number by a 1-digit number) and will soon be working on multiplying a 4-digit number by 1-digit number. There will be no school November 24-26 for Thanksgiving. Happy Fall!

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#### Note from the Nurse...

If your child has any special health needs or problems, this should be communicated to me. This information is kept confidential, and it can be very important to a successful experience in school. Examples of such needs are:

- 1. Food Allergy
- 2. Bee sting allergy
- 3. Allergy to any other substance
- 4. Difficulty with vision, hearing or speech
- 5. Need for medication during the school day

#### Data Driven

The holidays are quickly approaching, but those long breaks from school can still be filled with fun and learning. Scholastic Parent offers the following 5 ideas for keeping your student involved in math over holiday breaks!

<u>Create Surveys:</u> Children can create holiday surveys to collect data from family members at dinners and parties. Questions can range from holiday traditions to favorite gifts! Once kids have collected the data, they can create graphs (bar graph, pictograph, line plot) either on paper or online to display the results.

<u>Travel</u>: Many families travel over the holidays. Invite your children to become a part of the travel plans by using MapQuest or other resources to map out the best route to grandma's. They can estimate the time it would take and develop a schedule for the family according to holiday activities.

Holiday Toys: Children can research top holiday gifts from the years their parents or other relatives were kids. For example, find out the number one toy from 1975, how much it cost, and find the difference or price increase over the decades. This is a great way to incorporate many different curricula into one activity. Kids can make a report or poster to show their findings!

Westher: Everyone loves a White Christmas! How many times in the past 10, 20, or 50 years has it snowed on Christmas morning? Children can collect weather data on temperature, precipitation, and/or snowfall levels over the years.

Meth Fects: We definitely want to keep children's math facts fluent even over holiday breaks. So play mental math-counting games in the car, math war at restaurants, or have a math family game night so the efficiency and accuracy doesn't slow down.

Inquiry within the classroom fosters an environment where students investigate, analyze, and discuss information to create a greater understanding of content. Some of the activities students may do in their classroom to deepen their understanding of inquiry include: costa's level of questioning, socratic seminar, and philosophical chairs. At home you can assist us with teaching WICOR by talking about the importance of inquiry.
